Research guide: Niles Republican, 1839-1850

The Local History Branch of the Cass District Library has the following issues of the *Niles Republican* from the third issue printed on October 25, 1839-December 28, 1850.

The *Republican* was started in 1839, 15 years before the Republican Party formed in 1854. From the first issue, October 18, 1839-March 31, 1842 the *Niles Republican* was a Whig partisan newspaper.

The editor of the *Niles Republican* from April 7, 1842-April 1862 was Darius Burgess Cook, born in Litchfield, Connecticut on January 1, 1815. Cook started as a printer's rat at a New England paper, then moving to Michigan in 1836 he worked at a paper in Pontiac before heading to Washington, DC. While in our Nation's Capital he worked as a printer on the *Washington Intelligencer*, covering the actions of the US Senate which then included such giants as Henry Clay.

Under D.B. Cook's editorship the politics of the paper changed from Whig to Democratic.

He soon returned to Michigan and worked for the *Kalamazoo Gazette*, taking a leave of absence to spend the winter of 1839-1840 in the forests of Allegan and Barry Counties with the Indians and fighting off wolves and panthers. His accounts were written and published in 1889 in the book "Six Months Among Indians".

In 1842 he set out from Kalamazoo on the Chicago Road with a printing press on the back of a wagon and got as far as Niles. When he learned that Niles did not have a Democratic newspaper he stayed and bought the *Niles Republican* (started in 1839). Cook sold it in 1862, and started the *Niles Mirror*.

The major news story covered in the 1846 Niles Republican was the US-Mexican War. There is both national and local coverage of the war in these issues, offering fascinating insight during America's era of "Manifest Destiny".

The 1839-1850 issues of the *Niles Republican* contain marriage, death, and birth announcements of Cass County residents, in addition to advertisements for information for lost farm animals that went astray.
